
Occupational Profile

Food Service Supervisors

Workforce Composition

Food service supervisors work primarily in the accommodation and food services industry, accounting for 70.9% of the workforce. The manufacturing industry has the second-highest share of food service supervisors (6.2%). Just under 2% of food service supervisors in Canada work in the food and beverage manufacturing industry.



Provincial Distribution


Approximately a third of the food service supervisor workforce is concentrated in Ontario. Quebec has the second-highest share of the food service supervisor workforce. A notable share of workers is also concentrated in British Columbia and Alberta, comprising 14.1% and 13.3% of the workforce, respectively.

Age Profile


Food service supervisors have a significantly younger workforce compared to the overall workforce. In 2021, a quarter of the workforce were under the age of 25. This figure is double the share of 12.6% reported across all occupations. Just 10.5% of food service supervisors are aged 55 and older, which is significantly lower than the share of 23.1% across all occupations.

Gender


Men comprise 42.5% of the food service supervisor workforce, while women comprise 57.5%. This figure is higher than the share of women across all occupations (47.8%).



Immigration Status

Immigrants are a significant part of the food service supervisor workforce, comprising one-quarter (25.4%) of the occupation. This figure is consistent with the share of 25.8% across all occupations.


The food service supervisor occupation has successfully attracted recent immigrants, as shown in Figure 5. Recent immigrants (those who landed between 2016 and 2021) comprise nearly a third of immigrants in the food service supervisor workforce, notably higher than the share across all occupations.

Indigenous Peoples


In 2021, Indigenous People accounted for 3.4% of the food service supervisor workforce. This figure is slightly lower than the share of 4.1% across all occupations.





Visible Minorities

In 2021, visible minorities accounted for almost half (44.5%) of the food service supervisor workforce. This figure is nearly twenty percentage points higher than the share of 27.2% reported across all occupations.



Ethnic Origin


In 2021, the predominant ethnicities identified among food service supervisors in the workforce were "European Origins" and "Asian Origins". These ethnicities made up almost three-quarters of the workforce.





Education

In 2021, half of the food service supervisor workforce had a college or university-level education. This figure is slightly below the share of the overall workforce with higher education. In addition, a significant share (43.2%) of the food service supervisor workforce had a high school diploma or no certificate, diploma or degree. This figure is above the share of 34.1% across all occupations.

People with Disabilities

For this report, people with disabilities are defined as individuals in the workforce who report they 'often' or 'always' have difficulties with the activities of daily living (e.g., seeing, hearing, walking, learning, etc.) because of physical, mental, or other health-related issues.

In 2021, people with disabilities accounted for 13.4% of the food service supervisor workforce. This figure is two percentage points lower than the share across all occupations.
